Corning Liquor Proves Effective

Charles Kosty Imbibes and Fur-
nishes Much Excitement for
Fire and Police Departments

Charles Kosty, 23, of 174 East Market street, who furnished both the police and fire departments with plenty of excitement and no little action early Sunday morning, pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct when arraigned before City Judge Holland B. Williams today. He was fined \$10, placed on probation for three months with ordered to report weekly and ordered to pay \$20 for personal and property damage sustained by Harry Dagwell, of 140 West Fourth street.

According to police officers, firemen and other officials who handled the case, it all started when Kosty, in high glee as the result of an over-imbibing of some of the country's prohibited products, imagined there was a fire and rushing to the corner of Chestnut and Market streets, attempted to turn in an alarm.

Mr. Dagwell, who was en route home, is said to have spoken to

the man who was making frenzied attempts to pull the alarm. Kosty turned on Dagwell and struck a blow that knocked him down. Then Kosty is alleged to have kicked and mauled the prostrate man until Guy Guzzo and wife came to the rescue. Kosty then endeavored to hop on the side of a passing car with the result that he landed on Market street, bruised and battered.

A call was sent into the Fire Department and Chief John W. McCarthy and Captain Sheedy went to the scene where Dagwell, who is said to have closely resembled the victim of a train wreck, was removed to the office of Dr. H. E. Auringer where medical attention was rendered. It was necessary to take several stitches in a wound over one eye. Dagwell's clothes were badly torn according to police. Kosty was later arrested.
