3 Men Die in Area Traffic Accidents

Three men died as the result of traffic accidents over the weekend in The Star-Gazette territory.
The mishaps cost the lives of a Potter County soldier this morning, an Athens man injured Friday afternoon and a Corning man in a Horseheads creek plunge Sunday night.
The Horseheads accident was the fifth traffic fatality of the year in Chemung County.

Man Drowns In Freak Mishap

A certificate of accidental death by drowning was issued today in the death of Charles B. Kosty Jr., of 174 E. Market St., Corning, whose car plunged into Newtown Creek north of Horseheads at 10:30 Sunday night. Kosty, a Corning Glass Works employee, was 49.

Michael Kurchey, 70, of 108 E. Tioga Ave., Corning, who was riding with Kosty, is in fair condition at the Arnot-Ogden Hospital today with a possible skull fracture, and cuts and bruises of the head and nose.

Coroner M. E. Pittman, who released Kosty's body from the scene last night, said today that the victim had apparently been knocked unconscious when the car went out of control.

A witness told state police of Horseheads the Kosty car was approaching Horseheads on Rt. 13 at a high rate of speed when it left the right side of the road out of control.

It then hurtled back on the highway and skidded around heading the opposite direction from which it had come, swerved off the east side of the road across a 50-foot field, slewed over the steep 12-foot dike alongside the creek and somersaulted over the bank into the creek, police said.

Kurchey was thrown from the car as it crossed the field. The car landed on its left side in the creek in about three feet of water, with Kosty still behind the wheel.

Horseheads police were notified and relayed the alarm to state police of Horseheads via the Elmira Police Department radio. Horseheads Police Chief George Page and troopers assisted at the scene, which was about 50 feet north of the village line.

Horseheads firemen, under Chief George Sullivan, aided Kurchey, who was taken to the hospital in a Lynch ambulance, and removed Kosty's body from the car. Oxygen and artificial respiration were administered until the man was pronounced dead.

Firemen then attached a rope to the car, righted it and hauled it by hand to the east bank of the creek, from where it was towed away by an Alart Motors wrecker.

A search was started by firemen when a rumor spread that there had been a third man in the car. Firemen on each bank and in the middle of the stream hunted with lights as far as the Mill St. bridge, about a half-mile south, and called off the search early this morning after determining no other person was in the stream in that area.

A doctor was summoned from Elmira to assist until the coroner's arrival. Last rites were given to Kosty by a Catholic priest from Horseheads.

Potter County Soldier Killed

MANSFIELD—Benton E. Shaw, 21, of Austin Rd 1, Potter County, Pa., was killed this morning at 12:20 when his car crashed the rear of a tractor-trailer truck at

the top of a hill on U. S. Rt. 6 about 4 miles west of Mansfield. Shaw, a soldier, was returning to Camp Kilmer, N. J., after spending a furlough at home. He was alone in the car.

The truck was owned by the Midwest Haulers Inc., of Pittston, Pa., and driven by Walter Mekeel of Pittston Rd 1.

Pfc. William Heiss and Jack Williams of the state police substation at Mansfield said two Wellsboro ambulances responded to a call but that Shaw was dead upon their arrival.

The victim received a crushed chest and other injuries, the troopers said.

Dr. Harry Williams of Elkland, Tioga County coroner, was notified of the fatality but had not issued a verdict this morning.

The collection demolished the automobile, pushing the hood back under the windshield, and damaged the rear brake drums of the truck. The impact was so great that the doors in the truck cab were sprung open.

Injuries Fatal To Athens Man

ATHENS—Charles Birney, 68, of 309 N. Main St., injured Friday at 4 p. m. when the truck in which he was a passenger smashed through a bridge east of Athens, died at 4:20 a. m. Sunday at Robert Packer Hospital, Sayre.

Dr. Charles H. Dewan, Bradford County deputy coroner, said that Birney died of a fractured skull and a neck fracture.

Harry Wood, 24, of Waverly Rd 1, driver of the truck, blamed failure of his brakes on a winding hill road on the Orange Hill, North Rome, Pa. highway. The truck wound up in a creek bed. Wood was discharged from the hospital Saturday night following treatment.

Car Overturns, Wellsburg Man Escapes Injury

WAVERLY—John F. Anderson, 23, of Terrace St., Wellsburg, escaped injury at 3:20 this morning when the car he was driving left the road about two miles north of Spencer on Rt. 34 and overturned.

State Police of the Waverly substation reported that Anderson was going around a left curve when he dozed and the car went off on the right shoulder.

Anderson lost control of the vehicle, police said, tried to get back on the highway, went across the road and overturned on the opposite side of the road.

Fire Destroys Glen Area Home

WATKINS GLEN—Fire of undetermined origin, Sunday at 1:45 a. m., completely destroyed the small Sugar Hill home of Michael Stanko, 34.

Stanko told members of the Beaver Dams Fire Department that he was aroused by the crackling of flames and was able to flee the dwelling in safety.

Loss on the building and furnishings was estimated at \$2,000.

Jehovah's Witnesses Close Assembly

Civilization's end is near, Raymond L. Anderson declared before 800 persons Sunday at the climax of a three-day assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses in the Strand Theater.

Mr. Anderson, district supervisor of the Watchtower Bible and Trace Society, said: "According to Bible prophecy that end will come within this generation. Anderson took for his topic 'Is Civilization's End Near?' He said: 'Today there is a prevailing fear abroad among our politicians, our scientists and our religious leaders that a catastrophe again faces the human family brought about by such terrible weapons as the atom and hydrogen bombs, G-gas and bacteriological warfare.'"

The speaker said the Bible also speaks of a coming catastrophe known as the end of the world, "but the end of the world does not mean the end of the earth." "It is Satan's wicked world that is to be destroyed. It will be replaced by a new world of righteousness under the Kingdom of God," Anderson declared.

"There is only one place of safety and that is in God's new world society now operating. Civilization's end is near. Study the Bible that you may enjoy life under a perfect civilization that will never end," the speaker concluded.

William Barron of the Deposit, N. Y., congregation ended Sunday's program with a summary concluding talks by Fred H. of the Watchtower, followed by Plumhoff and Anderson.
