**Ben Youngs, Jr., Wins Action

Grocers Besieged by Sugar Rumors

No Increase in Price Due Floods Says Mr. Beyea; Warns Against Hoarding

Corning housewives are unnecessarily alarmed over rumor of an increase in the price of sugar due to floods in Louisiana, according to Herbert F. Beyea, secretary of Corning Wholesale Grocery Company. In making this announcement today, Mr. Beyea explained that many grocers of the city have been besieged with inquiries concerning the unfounded rumor.

Recent news dispatches concerning the damage caused to the Louisiana "sugar bowl," he claims have caused these reports and explains that statistics prove that the state of Louisiana produces only about one per cent of the world's supply of sugar. He states further that advices from New York indicate that the price declined there 10 cents a hundred yesterday and it is believed by local dealers that a reduction will be seen here.
