AGAINST SMALLPOX

**Dr. Moore Says Every Student in Syracuse
Must Be Vaccinated Within Three Days.**

GET VACCINATED!

Within the next three days the students in every school in the city must be vaccinated. This includes the students at the Syracuse university, the business colleges and all private schools.

Health Officer B. S. Moore informed a Telegram reporter this morning that within the next three days every person in Syracuse attending any kind of a school MUST be vaccinated. All the pupils in the public schools have already been vaccinated and before next Tuesday the students in all private schools MUST fulfill the requirements of the law. This order of Dr. Moore's will include the 1700 students of Syracuse university and the students at the business colleges. Those who are able to do so will be required to pay the expense of inoculation themselves, but those who are too poor to do this will be vaccinated at the expense of the city.

Stringent Measures Adopted.

These stringent measures on the part

of the board of health are called out by the case of smallpox which is reported to have originated in this city. Michael B. Smith of 1120 Avery avenue is ill at Schenectady and the physicians of that city say he is suffering from the dread disease. Smith was formerly an agent of the Prudential Life Insurance company of this city. He is the son of Mrs. Bridget Smith. He went to Schenectady about nine weeks ago to work for his brother, James. At Christmas time he came home to spend the holidays with his mother. While in the city he visited several relatives in different localities. About January 4 Smith returned to Schenectady. Yesterday James Smith received a letter from that city informing him of Michael's illness and saying that in all probability it was smallpox.

It Was Not Contracted Here.

Health Officer Moore says he does not think it probable that Smith contracted the disease in this city. If he is really suffering with it. As a precaution against it, however, every person who saw the suspect while he was in the city will be vaccinated. In some instances this has already been done. If by any possibility the malady should appear in this city every precaution will be taken against its spread and it is not probable that it will become prevalent.
