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WOMAN'S DEATH LAID TO CANNED PEAS POISONING

Ptomaine poisoning resulting from eating peas after they had been left in an opened tin can is believed responsible for the death of Mrs. Mary Exall, 55, Baldwinsville woman who died Saturday and who was buried Tuesday. County authorities Monday began an investigation of the death when they learned that it might have been caused by trichinosis, a parasitic poisoning resulting from improperly cooked pork.

Friends of Mrs. Exall tell a different story, however. They say that several days before her death the woman ate part of a can of peas. She left what remained in the opened can exposed to the air. The contents were probably tainted, they believe, and resulted in a poisoning similar to acute ptomaine.
