Fred L. Kohlburner Dies in California

Fred L. Kohlburner, 60, resident of the Groom Creek area for 25 years, and a brother of Mrs. Ada Lawton of Sycamore, passed away Sunday in the Veterans' Hospital at Sawtelle, Calif., where he had been a patient for two months.

He was born on June 22, 1888, in this community the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mathew Kohlburner. He was a veteran of World War One. He had a small ranch at Groom Creek and Prescott. Friends recall the beautiful dahlias and other flowers he grew there. He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Mae Johnson of Chicago, Mrs. Ada Lawton of Sycamore and Mrs. Harvey Martin of Oak Park, also a nephew and a niece, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis E. Marvin who reside at Prescott and several other nieces and nephews. A sister, Mrs. Charles Gautcher and a brother, George Kohlburner preceded him in death.

The body lay in state in Prescott until this Tuesday noon in the Hunter mortuary chapel, 129-131 North Pleasant street and the funeral services were conducted at 3:15 o'clock this afternoon, in the Whipple chapel, with Chaplain P. B. Ferry officiating. Burial will take place in the Whipple cemetery.
